Ken Bladen AM loved the military from the time he played with lead soldiers as a young boy during WW2. His father, a GP, was an honorary Army Captain examining recruits; his grandfather served in Gallipoli and France with 23rd Battalion - a 50 years old Padre from Victoria. Born in WA in 1934, Ken was the eldest of five siblings and spent his first four years of life in Narembeen WA where his father ran the local hospital.

In 1954, on completion of a 3-month National Service stint, Ken was selected for OCS Portsea, graduating as a 2nd Lieutenant and destined to be a career infantry officer.

For the next 21 years he served in various regimental, instructional and staff postings both in Australia and overseas. For three years he was a foundation member of the Special Air Service Company, subsequently posted to IRAR in 1957, to be a platoon commander in Malaya. Of his 30 years Army service, Ken says 1961 proved to be the fastest learning experience than at any other time. By now a Captain, he continued to serve in Malaya a further two years as Adjutant 2RAR.

Following Staff postings at HQ Ist Div in Sydney, Ken was sent to Puckapunyal (Victoria) to help raise 7RAR - becoming its inaugural Support Company commander as a Major. After training in 1966, 7RAR relieved 5RAR in Vietnam in April 1967 for 12 months. Ken was then selected to attend the 1968 Staff College Course at Queenscliff, following which he served at HQ Western Command. A crack shot - in 1969 he won the Queen's Medal to become Champion Shot of the Australian Army, using the 7.62mm Self Loading rifle. This skill probably influenced his next posting: to the Jungle Training Centre at Canungra (Qld) where he was a Tactics Instructor before spending a three-month attachment on the SEATO Writing Team in Bangkok. Promoted to Lieutenant Colonel, Ken became Commander Third Cadet Brigade in Melbourne.


After two years in this posting, Ken resigned from the Regular Army and transferred to the "Active Reserve" (Ares) in Perth WA. Ken had married Stephanie in the meantime and they had three daughters: two being born during Ken's active service. They had lived in 17 houses in 21 years during Ken's Army service - the time had come to 'settle'! After his military service, Ken became a Credit consultant/Debt collector. Civilian life also brought him the chance to pursue another interest. He began singing Bass in the WA Opera Company men's chorus and participated in a number of concerts and productions, including "Carmen", "The Pearl Fishers", "Die Fledermaus", "Orpheus in the Underworld", "Falstaff" and "The Elixir of Love".

Ken was elected to be State President of the RSL WA Branch in 1998 and served three terms - to 2001. He is credited with having "turned the League in WA around". Subsequently he was appointed a member of the Order of Australia (AM), awarded the Centenary Medal and also appointed an Honorary RSL National Vice Chairman for Life. Ken's wife, Stephanie, is the daughter of a former POW(J) who was forced to help build the Burma-Thailand railway. Among many community and ex-service organisations to whom this accomplished man has devoted his time and energies has been the Burma Thai Railway Memorial Association (BTRMA): he served as President 2004-2008. He spent two years as a senior committee member of the P&C of Methodist Ladies College; was Patron of the Airborne Forces Assn of WA for six years;



mittees of the RUSI and Highgate RSL Sub-Branch, is a Life Member of Guildford Grammar School, and been a Freemason for a remarkable 50 years! All this and he taught himself to play the piano as well.

Although having ably proved himself as a tough and professional "warrior" in his time, Ken is a gentle, kind and sensitive family man and friend to many. What a rich life! And long may those well-tuned tonsils continue to lead us into the National Anthem Ken!

TRIBUTE TO A REMARKABLE AUSTRALIAN

Paul Joseph Ramsay AO, exceptional businessman and philanthropist, was born in Sydney in 1936. He attended St Ignatius College, Riverview. He had suffered a heart attack whilst in Spain, and died at his home in Bowral (NSW) on I May.

In 1964, he founded one of the first private psychiatric hospitals in Sydney, which, after a shaky start evolved into Ramsay Health Care, a private hospital company now comprised of 117 hospitals in Australia and Europe, of which he was Chairman of the Board. One of these is Hollywood Private Hospital - which has generously sponsored our Sub-Branch for a number of years; and we are very grateful.

Paul Ramsay enjoyed widespread respect for his ethics as well as his philanthropy. In his Will he bequeathed his fortune of over \$3 billion to our nation - the largest bequest ever made by a private citizen in its history. He never married. A fine and good man. We salute his memory. **May he Rest in Peace.**
