President Jingil Lee particularly thanked those Service members who helped secure their freedom, with special recognition of those who were KIA or WIA during the Korean conflict.

Highgate RSL Sub-Branch was especially grateful for the kind donation by our guest of 12 bottles of plum wine which will be used for raffle prizes.

South China Sea geopolitics | Our guest speaker was member, Alex Kerr, who has a remarkable history of academic and work achievements throughout his life, including surviving an escape with seven machine gun wounds from his burning bomber, and three escapes from POW camps (the last one successfully) in Germany during WWII.

Alex delivered a perceptive and thorough insight into the history and strategic trade and military importance of the South China Sea. The relevance of the South China Sea to Australia and all those countries on its shores or reliant on its resources, as well as unhindered and safe passage of shipping through this area, was clearly put into context if China continues its expansion and influence in the region.

Alex shared his great knowledge of the current military and proposed military strengths of the proponents in the area, and what is at stake if there is not a balance of power for peace in the region.

Alex, on behalf of members and guests present, please accept our sincere thank you for your professional presentation. Please also pass on our thanks to your daughter, Robyn, for coordinating the slides during you talk. I am sure your excellent address gave all members present a timely reminder of the RSL motto *The price of liberty is eternal vigilance* and the inscription on the side of Anzac House *They only deserve freedom who are prepared to defend it.*

Report | Honour **Avenue Group**

Rod Halcombe advises that the Honour Avenue Group conducted a quarterly **Dedication Ceremony at** Kings Park on Saturday 18 February where 12 new plagues were dedicated and affixed to posts on the Honour Avenues. Demand for plaque dedications for the rest of the year is also encouraging.

Plans for the ANZAC Wall at May Circle are now well under way, with the project fully funded, and work about to commence.

Anzac Centenary commemorative period | 2014 - 2018 Domestic and overseas commemorations

The Anzac Centenary **Commemorative Period spanning** 2014 to 2018 is featuring major overseas commemorations to recognise Australian service and sacrifice since Federation.

Attendance passes will be required for most overseas commemorations conducted by DVA within the safe, secure and comfortable carrying capacity of the commemorative sites.

Check with the Department of Veteran Affairs to register for an attendance pass (no cost) and learn more about these commemorations by visiting

overseascommemorations.ticketek. com.au/. (Passes are not required to attend domestic commemorations.)

Service-specific information is provided, as well as what to expect and how to prepare before you travel.

Overseas, Australia will commemorate the 100th anniversaries of the Battle of Bullecourt in France, the Battle of Polygon Wood in Belgium and the Battle of Beersheba in Israel from the First World War.

The Australian Government will support Anzac Day Dawn Services in France, Turkey, Papua New Guinea, Thailand and Borneo in 2017.

On 25 April, the commemoration of the Centenary of the Battle of Bullecourt will be recognised in a service at the Digger Memorial in the Australian Memorial Park in Bullecourt. More than 1,100 Australians were taken prisoner during the Battle of Bullecourt - the largest number captured in a single engagement during the First World War.

A commemoration to mark the Centenary of the Battle of Polygon Wood will be held at Buttes New British Cemetery in Zonnebeke, Belgium on 26 September 2017. Polygon Wood was one of five battles in which Australians were involved as part of the larger British and Dominion offensive known as the Third Battle of Passchendaele. In eight weeks of fighting, there were 38.000 Australian casualties.

In Israel on 31 October 2017, a commemoration will recognise the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Beersheba, and the famous charge of the 4th Light Horse Brigade. At sunset on 31 October 1917, the Light Horsemen charged the Turkish lines using their bayonets as swords. The momentum of the surprise attack carried them through the Turkish defences and more than 1,000 prisoners were taken.

In 2017 Australia will also mark its other days of national commemoration including Battle for Australia Day, Merchant Navy Day and Remembrance Day.

In Australia, commemorations are being held for 75th anniversaries of Second World War events - the Fall of Singapore, the Battle of the Coral Sea, Bomber Command operations, the Battle of Milne Bay, the Battle of El Alamein and the culmination of the North Africa campaigns, and Kokoda and the Beachheads.

A commemoration will also be held to recognise the 70th anniversary of the contribution made by Australian peacekeepers and peacemakers around the world.

"As a nation, we continue to honour the service and sacrifice of the men and women who have served in defence of our nation," said Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Dan Tehan MP, in announcing the 2017 overseas commemoration services.

"It is incredibly moving to stand on a foreign field where Australians have fought and died for our values and reflect on the enormous debt we owe to the men and women who serve in our military.

"Many Australians will be planning overseas trips this year to attend a commemoration service and pay their respects, and I encourage them to register early."

Rare and weird facts about World War II

- ♦ The first German serviceman killed in the war was killed by the Japanese
- ♦ More than 100,000 Allied bomber crew were killed over Europe
- ♦ More U.S. servicemen died in the Air Corps than the Marine Corps
- Polish Catholic midwife Stanislawa Leszczyńska delivered 3,000 babies at the Auschwitz concentration camp
- ♦ In World War II, British soldiers got a ration of three sheets of toilet paper a day. Americans got 22
- Four of every five German soldiers killed in the war died on the Eastern Front
- ♦ Only 20 percent of the males born in the Soviet Union in 1923 survived the war
- In World War II, the youngest serviceman in the United States military was Calvin Graham - aged 12. Graham lied about his age when he enlisted in the US Navy and his real age was not discovered until after he was wounded
- Only one out of every four men serving on U-boats survived
- ♦ The Siege of Stalingrad resulted in more Russian deaths (military and civilian) than the United States and Britain combined in all of World War II
- ♦ To avoid using the German sounding name 'hamburger' during World War II, Americans used the name 'Liberty Steak'
- ♦ Adolf Hitler's nephew, William Hitler, served in the US Navy during World War II
- ♦ Adolph Hitler and Henry Ford each kept a framed picture of the other on his desk
- During World War II, the largest Japanese spy ring was located in Mexico
- ♦ The mortality rate for POWs in Russian camps was 85 percent
- ♦ Had it been necessary for a third atom bomb, the city targeted would have been Tokyo
- An Imperial Japanese Army intelligence officer who fought in the Philippines in World War II, Hiroo Onoda, never surrendered until his former commander traveled from Japan to personally issue orders relieving him from duty in 1974
- ♦ Total casualties for World War II totalled between 50-70 million people, 80 percent of whom came from only four countries Russia, China, Germany and Poland. Over 50 percent of casualties were civilians, with the majority being women and children
